
'Barn find' World Rally Championship Subaru could fetch more than \$1 million at auction

A "barn find" Subaru rally car could be the latest vehicle to fetch more than \$1 million at auction when it goes under the gavel this weekend.

The 1994 Subaru Prodrive 555 Group A is a genuine world rally championship car that was driven by rally legend Colin McRae and teammate Carlos Sainz, and was retired from competition in 1996.

Since then, it has sat untouched and collecting dust. Today, after a rigorous check of the car's history, it could be worth an easy seven figures.
